ARMAND THEODORE PALATUCCI '64

"Ted" Palatucci, 77, passed away peacefully in his sleep on the evening of 19 January 2020.

A native of the Bronx, Ted was born on 2 May 1942. He attended Fordham Preparatory School before being admitted to the Naval Academy, where he graduated with the Class in June of 1964.

He first reported to the Aviation Training Command for flight training. Upon completion, he joined VAW-11 at NAS Coronado and was assigned

to Carrier Air Wing 7 in HANCOCK (CVA-19). He made two cruises to Southeast Asia and qualified as a landing signals officer. He then was assigned to the Training Command as an instructor in VT-5. Ted considered this to be his best job, and he always had great love for the T-28 he flew during that time.

After serving in the Navy, Ted enjoyed very many successful years on Wall Street, working in the Public Finance field, raising capital for state and local governments around the country. He worked at Merrill Lynch for ten years, rising to the level of Managing Director in the Municipal Markets Group, where he was responsible for all municipal bond capital market activities for the firm. Ted then became a senior vice president at Dolphin Bradbury, working in structured finance and specializing in the securitization and private placement of project related debt capital. Next, Ted became a partner at Andres Capital Management in Berwyn, PA.

Ted was a member of St. Mary Magdalene Church (Media, PA). He was an avid golfer and at one point was a 1 handicap. He was an accomplished woodworker, a private charter pilot in Florida and loved his English Sheepdog, Bogey. He was a passionate fan of the NY Yankees, NY Giants and Navy football.

He is survived by his son, Ted Jr.; and brothers, Richard, Joseph and Fr. John.

Ted will be remembered by his 12th Company Shipmates, especially the "Sofa Kings," as a good and trusted friend, a quick wit, keen intellect and an indomitable New York spirit. Ted could be depended upon for sage advice and a wise solution to any emergent problem encountered in the Company. As a Plebe, he was one of the leaders in getting the Company through a tough year. Throughout his life, he was steadfast in his love for Country and the Navy. He is sorely missed by all.

Ted's remains will be laid to rest in the Naval Academy Columbarium at a later date. ★



ANDREW MICHAEL PRYDYBASZ '65

Commander Andrew M. Prydybasz, USN (Ret.), passed away on 2 April 2020 after suffering a heart attack.

A native of Pennsylvania, "Andy" graduated from Muhlenberg Township High School and spent a year at Penn State before entering the Naval Academy. During First Class Year, he was in the 34th Company and was often on the Superintendent's List.

After graduation, Andy served aboard KEPPLER (DD-765) and then went through A-6 bombardier navigator training and was assigned to VA-176. An unexpected aircraft ejection and resulting injuries forced him to leave the squadron early and move to an assignment at the Naval Plant Representative Office (NavPro) Baltimore at the Westinghouse Defense Plant as a contract administration program manager.

In September 1975, Andy completed Naval Postgraduate School and was awarded an MS in Aeronautical Engineering. Upon retiring from the Navy, he relocated to St. Louis, MO, to work for Boeing/McDonald Douglas in engineering and weapons systems design.

Andy donated a tail-hook from his plane for the Class of 1965's goat statue at the Navy/Marine Corps Memorial Stadium and it is buried in the granite base beneath the statue.

He cherished many things in life including traveling, all forms of art and red wine.

Andy is survived by his loving wife, Sondra; and his granddaughter, Gwendolyn. He was preceded in death by his parents, Helen and Andrew Prydybasz; his son, Chris Prydybasz; and daughter, Judith Oleskevich.

A memorial service with military honors will be scheduled for some time in June at the Jefferson Barracks National Cemetery in St. Louis, MO, followed by a Celebration of Life.

RICHARD CHARLES SALMON '66

Richard C. Salmon died on 27 April 2020. He was 76 years old.

"Dick" arrived at USNA via Boot Camp and NAPS. He was a quiet sailor with a calm demeanor, but an avid and physical competitor on the athletic field. At Navy, he was an All-American lacrosse midfielder. He played on the undefeated Plebe team and as a Youngster was on Navy's National Championship team that also beat Army. He also

enjoyed playing Company football. During Dick's Academy years, he never burned up the academics, but was a solid student, highly respected counselor and mentor to underclassmen and always took time to find ways to improve his Classmates morale, especially when they were recovering from injuries.

At his first duty assignment in BORDELON (DD-881), he deployed with the Sixth Fleet in the Med, followed by a WestPac to the Seventh Fleet in support of the Vietnam War. He next served in FALGOUT (DE-324) and again deployed to the Tonkin Gulf. Dick completed his active duty in MADDOX (DD-731), supporting Naval Reserve training operations in EastPac.

After leaving the Navy in 1970, he drove the ALCAN Highway and briefly stayed in Alaska. Returning to the lower 48, he planned to buy a dairy farm in Kentucky. His parents' medical issues caused him to return to his hometown of Pitman, NJ, to take over his father's business, Salmon's Signs, which he managed until he died.

In retirement, Dick served on the council for the Borough of Pitman from 1977-1979, overseeing public works. He was also Pitman's mayor from 1980-1983.

He closely followed the Naval Academy lacrosse team, was an avid supporter of Pop Warner football and played golf at every opportunity. He supported Class of 1966 events by providing Class crest appliques for golf carts and other printed material.

Dick is survived by his children (and their spouses), Richard C. Jr. (Jennifer) and Neil (Erica); fiancée, Genevieve "Gene" Cressman; brother, Harry Jr. '63 (Doris); and sister, Bette Drexler (Chris). He was "Poppy" to his grandchildren Luke, Piper, Holly, Grace and Charley; and to his extended grandchildren,

Robert, Rachel, Sean, Hannah, Laura, Monica, Corrine, Nicole, Andrew, Danielle, Nicky, Joy and Maddie.

Funeral services were held on 1 May 2020 in Pitman, NJ, followed by interment at Hillcrest Memorial Park. A memorial service will be held at a later date.

JAMES WILSON BARRETT '67

Commander James W. Barrett, USN (Ret.), passed away peacefully at Delaware Hospice Center in Milford, DE, on 20 March 2020.

"Jim" was born in Baltimore, MD, on 14 September 1945 to the late Dorothy and Frank Barrett. He was a 1963 graduate of Towson High School in Towson, MD, where he excelled playing baseball and soccer. He was recruited to play soccer at the Naval Academy, but a leg injury Plebe Year prevented him

from playing. He graduated from USNA with the Class of 1967, Fifth Company.

After completing flight training, Jim served four years in patrol squadron VP-16, homeported in Pensacola, FL, flying the P-3 Orion antisubmarine patrol aircraft and deploying to Spain, Italy and South America.

His next tour was at the Bureau of Naval Personnel as the P-3 placement officer. The Navy then sent Jim to The George Washington University, where he earned an MBA in financial management.

His next duty station was in the nuclear aircraft carrier EISENHOWER (CVN-69) as communications officer. Jim was proud to be an IKE plankowner and to be one of the ship's first officers to qualify as officer of the deck underway.

After a tour with VP-56 as operations officer, Jim became an Aeronautical Engineering Duty Officer, specializing in the procurement, maintenance and repair of aircraft. His last two Navy assignments were with the Naval Air Systems Command, where he was directly responsible for the funding, development, procurement and support for new and retrofit P-3 programs.

Upon retiring from the Navy, Jim bought and operated a bed & breakfast in St. Michaels, MD. In 2006, he retired to Lewes, DE. He was a member of the Lewes Rotary Club, Military Officers Association, USNA Alumni Association, and the Realtors Association of Sussex County.

Jim was a true American patriot who was proud of his country and his 20 years of naval service. He loved playing golf, attending USNA football games and supporting the Baltimore Orioles. Jim was a member of the Episcopal Parish of All Saints and St. George's Chapel.

Jim is survived by his wife, Mary Catherine (Durkin) Barrett; two sons, Christopher (Lauren) and Michael (Katherine); stepchildren Elizabeth Steele (Dean), Edward Durkin (Kristen), Catherine Keely and Patrick Durkin (Kimberly); nine grandchildren, Joshua (Kristen), Garrett, Patrick, Joseph, William, Zachary, Shawn, Kylie and Molly; and a great-grandson, Wyatt. Jim was predeceased by his brother, Ensign Daniel Barrett '71, USN.

A memorial will be held at a later date. ★



PAUL HELMUT WAGNER '68

Paul H. Wagner passed away on 28 May 2020 of complications following heart surgery.

He was born on 21 May 1945 in Sulzbach, Germany. He lost his father, Peter Wagner, two years after his birth, due to wounds received on the Russian front during World War II. Along with his mother and two siblings, he emigrated to the United States in 1949, settling in Tallahassee, FL. He was a 1963 graduate of Leon High School.

After studying at Florida State University for one year, he entered the U.S. Naval Academy in June 1964. Paul's calm demeanor and ability to find humor in any situation helped many of his classmates endure the rigors of Plebe Year. His preferred sport was crew, where he earned varsity Plebe and Brigade Championship numerals. A habitual denizen of the Superintendent's and Dean's lists, he was always available to help less gifted classmates with their studies. Paul's leadership earned him an assignment as 31st Company Sub Commander.

Upon graduation, he entered naval flight training, receiving his Wings of Gold and an assignment as an A-6 Intruder bombardier-navigator. In 1972, he deployed on SARATOGA (CV-60) to Yankee Station off the coast of Vietnam, where he flew 185 combat missions over the Hanoi-Haiphong Triangle. While in Vietnam, he was awarded three Distinguished Flying Crosses for gallantry, 12 Air Medals and numerous campaign and meritorious unit commendations. In the words of his pilot, "He had a great wit, a high degree of intelligence, a heart of gold and the courage of a lion."

Paul returned to Tallahassee and lived a quiet life on his farm on the city's outskirts, surrounded by friends and neighbors, where among other things, he enjoyed studying military history and providing support to the KWB Pathology Associates group that maintains a courier system for all manner of medical logistical and other transportation needs, logging nearly a million miles over many years.

He was preceded in death by his father; mother, Elizabeth Wagner; and his sister, Hildegard Wagner Schow ("Doc" Schow, USMA '55). He is survived by his brother, Hans Wagner (USMA '61) of Huntsville, AL.

A virtual memorial service was held on 17 June 2020 for his classmates, shipmates and friends. Inurnment will take place at Tallahassee National Cemetery later this summer.
