

Shipmate

Commander Roy S. Phillips '44, USN (Ret.), is 99 and his 100th birthday is in May. His son, Gary, said in an email to *Shipmate* that the magazine is one of the few his father still receives. Commander Phillips lost his shipmate, Emily—his wife of 68 years—in June 2019. Gary shared a photo of his father with the October issue of *Shipmate* and provided Commander Phillips' biography.

"Roy Stribling Phillips was born in Clifton, TN, in 1921. Having built two sailboats in his youth and become a lover of the sea, it was inevitable that he would find himself in the Navy. He graduated early from Annapolis in 1943 and served on NORTH CAROLINA in the Pacific Ocean until the end of the war.

After the war, he was working as a canal docks engineer when he met his future wife, Emily Brown. Roy moved with Emily to Memphis, TN, in the early '50s and became manager of maintenance at the Quaker Oats Company. There they raised a daughter, Gail, and a son, Gary. Emily and Roy sailed as often as they could on a Dolphin class boat at Pickwick Lake until the hazards involved became too worrisome for the family.

As Roy Phillips approaches his 100th birthday in 2021, we ask that you remember two things: tell a parent or a child that you love them and either sail or dream of sailing."

Parachuting



"I just received my September 2020 Shipmate and read with interest, and a big smile on my face, Skip Wheeler's 'Leap of Faith' article in Feedback. Right after graduation, I reported to Pensacola to begin flight training, earning my wings in

October 1967. My 'dream sheet' had A1 Skyraider written all over it, but with only one squadron left on active duty and transitioning to A6's in two months, the detailer said the next closest thing was to 'plow back' as a TPA (Transition, Precision, Aerobatics) flight instructor to NAS Whiting, VT-2, instructing in the T-28B/C.

I loved flying—and instructing—at VT-2. In February 1968, (as best I can remember) our ops boss called an impromptu all hands safety meeting because of a situation that was occurring in the training command, and the fleet. It seems that there was a rash of incidents concerning loss of aircraft in the recent months where pilots were bailing out of aircraft that were almost 'perfectly good airplanes' as Skip put it. After interviewing the pilots post-accident, it was determined that several of the pilots that had experienced a minor inflight

abnormality with their aircraft but also had experience with sport sky diving had no fear of using their parachute and therefore 'hit the silk' instead of trouble shooting what was determined to be just a minor situation.

So, bottom line, the word was put out to all instructors to highly discourage all your students from partaking in sport sky diving while in the training command in order to save some huge losses that the Navy was experiencing."

From Chip Seymour, 25 Sep The Lighthouse Bistro opened in January 2017 as a restaurant that was successful due to our daughter, Beth Rocca, having established herself as a top chef and food and beverage director in a number of restaurants throughout a couple of decades prior to the Bistro. The Lighthouse Bistro opportunity was unique as it (besides being a high-quality restaurant) provided a vehicle for forward mobility, as the vast majority of its staff was made up of men and women, who faced employment barriers, due to alcohol or drug abuse (or similar serious infractions of the law).

Consequently, the Lighthouse Shelter trained (and counseled)

folks with employment barriers who, after successful training, gained employment at the Lighthouse Bistro. In effect, the increasingly popular Lighthouse Bistro continued to succeed, through training and counseling, not only as a top-rated restaurant but also as a Social Enterprise. While Covid restrictions have brought the Lighthouse Bistro restaurant operations to a near halt, its staff continues to feed the vulnerable population of Annapolis (40,000 meals have been served over the past 6 months). That service to the community has been applauded; however, the Lighthouse Bistro patrons are most anxious for the restaurant itself to re-open soon.



NORMAN ARLON DEAN '65

On 27 October 2020, Captain Norman A. Dean, USN (Ret.), cast off the wicked chains of Parkinson's disease and set sail on his final voyage.

"Norm" was born on 8 August 1943, to the late Dorothella and Norman R. Dean in Amarillo, TX. At the Naval Academy, he was a member of the 36th Company during First Class Year.

Norm was a naval submariner and physician for 30 years.

His naval career included nuclear engineering in GEORGE WASHINGTON CARVER (SSBN-656); a scholarship to the Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine; an internship at Balboa Medical Center in San Diego, CA; family practice residency at Camp Pendleton, CA; training at the Undersea Medical Institute in Groton, CT; diving and medical officer for the submarine tender and squadron in Guam; a master's in Public Health from Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, MD; OIC Navy Environmental and Preventive Medicine Unit #6 in Pearl Harbor, HI; commanding officer of the naval hospital in Groton, CT; personnel officer to the Navy Surgeon General at the Navy Bureau of Medicine in Washington, DC; and fleet medical officer for SurfLant, Norfolk, VA.

After retiring from the Navy in 1995, he continued to serve as a medical locum tenens in rural areas of Virginia for the next ten years.

After Norm's final retirement, he sailed solo to the Bahamas and Key West, during which he diagnosed his Parkinson's. He continued to sail with family and friends for many years from his home port in Norfolk, VA, where he lived with his loving wife of 55 years, Linda Bower Dean.

JOHN FILIP JUNEK '67

Captain John F. Junek, USN (Ret.), died on 6 August 2020 after a four-year fight against cancer, which studies at Walter Reed and the National Institutes of Health determined was linked to exposure to Agent Orange during combat deployments to Southeast Asia. He was 75 years old.

After his Naval Academy graduation in 1967, John reported for flight training and was designated a Naval Flight Officer in 1968. His primary specialty

was air to air warfare. Additionally, he was a board selected Major Weapons Systems Acquisitions Program Manager, a proven subspecialist in Engineering Flight Test, Operations Analysis, Applied Logic and Financial Management. His post-Academy education included Navy Fighter Weapons School ("Top Gun"), USAF Air Command and Staff College, Naval Test Pilot School and an MBA from Auburn University.

Operational assignments included two combat deployments aboard KITTY HAWK in VF-114; three deployments aboard Constellation in VF-24, which won the Clifton Award, the Battle "E" and the "MUTHA" trophy twice; and two deployments aboard ENTERPRISE as commanding officer of VF-213, named the Most Improved Command by the Commander in Chief, U.S. Pacific Fleet. During his command tour, he provided F-14 aircraft for, flew in, and coordinated the shipboard flying segments of the movie "Top Gun." Back at sea, John was commanding officer of the deep draft oiler ROANOKE (AOR-7).

Captain Junek flew 261 combat missions, logged over 3,300 flight hours, made 962 carrier landings in fighter aircraft, sailed six of the seven seas, rounded Cape Horn, transited the Panama Canal, and sailed north of the Arctic Circle and south of the Antarctic Circle.

Assignments ashore included seven years at the Pentagon as a TacAir analyst and program sponsor for the F-14 aircraft and executive assistant to the Chief of Staff, Supreme Allied Commander, Atlantic.

His awards include the Defense Superior Service Medal, Legion of Merit, Meritorious Service Medal (2), Air Medal (15), Navy Commendation Medal w/Combat V, Navy Unit Commendation, Meritorious Unit Commendation and Navy "E" Ribbon (2).

After retirement, John worked as the Corporate Business Development Director for Naval Aviation Programs for Lockheed Martin, where he was on the design and capture team for the F-35 Joint Strike Fighter.

He then retired to Southern Maryland to farm, hunt and fish.

He is survived by his wife of 48 years—his high school sweetheart, Kathryn (Sinclair) Junek; two children, Karenan and John; and three grandchildren.

Services are scheduled for 13 May 2021 at the USNA Chapel. *
