ARTHUR MAJOR '44

Commander Arthur Major, USN (Ret.), died on Saturday, 20 March 2021.

"Art" was born in South Bend, IN, where he graduated from James Whitcomb Riley High School, and after two years in engineering at Purdue University, he won a congressional appointment to the U.S. Naval Academy, entering on 6 June 1940 and graduating on 9 June 1943.

Following graduation with the Class of 1944,

he served in Forrest (DD-461), participating in the D-Day landing at Utah Beach, Normandy, then in the invasion of Southern France at St. Tropez on 15 August 1944, and in the invasion of Okinawa in April 1945, where Forrest was substantially damaged by a Japanese kamikaze attack.

After World War II, he served as executive officer of Mervine (DMS-31), Daly (DD-519) and Calvert (APA-32). He also served tours of duty in Fargo (CL-106) and Sicily (CVE-118). His shore duty assignments included teaching Plebe steam at the Naval Academy, teaching marine engineering at the Naval Postgraduate School in Monterey, CA, and three years in a diplomatic status in the American Embassy in Copenhagen, Denmark, as a member of the Military Assistance Advisory Group to the Danish Navy. He completed a course in Work Study (industrial engineering) at HMS Victory in Portsmouth, England, and served as the officer-in-charge, Fleet Work Study Group, Atlantic, in Norfolk, VA, where the Navy's Material Maintenance Management Program was developed under his guidance. He attended postgraduate school at Stanford University in Palo Alto, CA, where he earned a master's degree in personnel administration. He retired from the Navy on 1 August 1964.

Following retirement, he and his wife, Joan, and their family made their home in Tarzana, CA, and then in Calabasas, where he was employed as director of Real Estate and Construction for Abbey Rents, then as facility

engineer for Rain Bird Sprinkler Manufacturing Corp., and finally as facility engineer for Occidental College, retiring fully in 1986. Their last place of residence was at Blue Skies Ranch in Tarzana.

Art was predeceased by Joan, his wife of 71 years, in January 2021. They are survived by three loving daughters, Beth Phillips (Randy), Susan Kingsley (Robert) and Pati Zaccaria (David); five grandchildren, Adam, Samantha, Allison, Jennifer and McKenna; and eight great-grandchildren, Hunter, Madison, Kingsley, Rocco, Isabella, Juliet, Cade and Henley.

MILTON JOHN SCHULTZ JR. '50

Rear Admiral Milton J. Schultz Jr., USN (Ret.), passed peacefully in his sleep on 26 February 2021 at his home in Falls Church, VA.

Born in Salina, KS, in 1926, "Milt" was raised with his five brothers and sisters during the Great Depression. The challenges overcome by his family laid the foundation for his faith, incomparable work ethic and abiding commitment to helping others, strengths that carried him through a vibrant family life and an exemplary naval career.

Graduating with the Naval Academy Class of 1950, he married the love of his life, Mary Jane Strowig, in the USNA Chapel on 2 June 1950.

Attaining the first of his several at sea commands very early in his Navy career, his final seagoing command was as Commander, Destroyer Squadron 22. His decisive leadership as on scene commander following the horrific collision between JOHN F. KENNEDY (CV-67) and BELKNAP (CG-26) was credited with the saving of many lives. Upon his promotion to rear admiral, he served with distinction in key positions in Naval, Joint and International combined military communications assignments, earning both the Defense Superior Service Medal and the Defense Distinguished Service Medal.



ROBERT WILLIAM EASTON '64

Robert W. Easton passed away peacefully in his sleep during the early morning of 1 January 2021. Bob had health battles with Crohn's disease, congestive heart failure resulting from a viral infection of his heart in 1995, and continuing issues with COPD over the last 30 years, which severely restricted his activities.

"Bob" was born on 15 September 1940 and grew up in Hawthorne, CA. He attended El Camino

Junior College for one year prior to being recruited for entry into the Naval Academy's Class of 1963, one of 13 Southern California junior college and high school football players recruited that year. He loved playing football and lettered at Navy. When his eligibility ended prior to his First Class year, he volunteered to help coach the Plebe team. Bob was in the 19th Company and graduated with the Class of 1964.

After graduating, Bob served aboard DIACENKO (APD-23) and spent two years working with UDT units conducting beach surveys and Market Time operations off the coast of Vietnam. He was next assigned to BRULE (AKL-28), supporting the Brown Water Navy in the Mekong River Delta. He completed his Vietnam service with the 3rd Battalion 7th Marines as naval gunfire liaison officer outside Da Nang. On shore duty, Bob was first lieutenant of the Anti-Submarine Warfare School in San Diego, during which he earned a master's degree in Management Science from United States International University.

Upon leaving the Navy in 1973, Bob sailed on San Diego's tuna fleet ships as a navigator and transit captain. With Pacific tuna fishing declines, he went to work as a marine engineer for Planning Research Corporation (PRC) and successor companies for the next 17 years as a program manager.

After retiring, a gig as a substitute teacher led to his working as an assistant football coach for Vern Von Sydow '63 at Mar Vista High School. Bob also worked with H&R Block Associates as a Master Tax Preparer for 15 years.

Bob is survived by his wife of 51 years, Susan Holmquist Easton; daughters, Marcella of Oregon and Lara, an attorney for the San Diego Police Department. Bob's Funeral Mass and interment at Holy Cross Cemetery in Culver City
